

## USING ALREADY, YET, STILL, AND ANYMORE DESCRIPTION

	USE	EXAMPLES
<b>already</b>	<p><i>Idea:</i> something has happened or begun in the past, often unexpected. Something has finished / ended sooner than expected.</p> <p><i>type of sentence:</i> positive statements / sometimes in questions.</p> <p><i>most common position:</i> midsentence, but sometimes at the end of a sentence as well.</p>	<p>She <b>already</b> finished her assignment.</p> <p>They are <b>already</b> waiting for you in the living room.</p> <p>I finished my dinner <b>already</b>.</p> <p>Have you <b>already</b> bought your tickets?</p>
<b>yet</b>	<p><i>Idea:</i> something hasn't happened yet, but you expect it to happen in the future, perhaps near future.</p> <p><i>type of sentence:</i> negative statements / questions.</p> <p><i>most common position:</i> end of sentence.</p>	<p>The mail usually arrives at 1 PM, but it's 2 PM, and it hasn't arrived <b>yet</b>. I wonder when it will arrive.</p> <p>Has John finished his test <b>yet</b>?</p> <p>Have you eaten <b>yet</b>?</p>
<b>still</b>	<p><i>Idea:</i> something began in the past, and it continues now.</p> <p><i>type of sentence:</i> positive and negative statements / questions.</p> <p><i>most common position:</i> midsentence</p>	<p>The mail <b>still</b> hasn't arrived.</p> <p>Jonah is <b>still</b> taking his test.</p>

**anymore**

*Idea:* something that was true in the past, but it isn't true now. Usually indicates that something has changed.

*type of sentence:* negative statements / sometimes in questions, but not often.

*most common position:* end of sentence.

John and Mary lived in Florida for ten years, but they don't live there **anymore**. They moved to Pittsburgh last year.

You're not allowed to rent here **anymore**.
